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COVID-19 information

- CDC Quarantine recommendations: please check the CDC website

- WSU Housing quarantine requirements for students living on campus only: A resident who returns from travel or stopovers at any countries or areas with travel advisories set at CDC levels 2 and 3, or who have been exposed directly to a confirmed case of COVID-19, must quarantine themselves for 14 days immediately upon return. https://housing.wayne.edu/coronavirus/quarantine



COVID-19 information

- Masks are no longer required for fully-vaccinated individuals
 when they are indoors on campus. Those who have not been
 vaccinated are still required to wear masks indoors on campus,
 except when eating or drinking. Masks are not required outdoors.

- Students who are in possession of a valid I-20 can enter the U.S.
- Per the SEVIS COVID guidance, new students must be enrolled in <u>at least one</u> <u>course that is coded as in-person or hybrid</u>. Contact your department if you cannot find a course coded as such.
- Canadian citizens who are enrolled in a program at a U.S. institution and have a valid I-20 are exempt from the Canadian government quarantine requirements: https://travel.gc.ca/travel-covid/travel-restrictions/isolation

Immigration documents

- Your I-20 or DS-2019 issued by Wayne State University it includes your SEVIS number
- Your passport should always be valid for 6 months in the future
- Your I-94 (Arrival/Departure Record) is stapled to your
 passport if you entered the U.S. by land or can be obtained on
 the CBP website after each entry by air into the U.S.

What is SEVIS?

- SEVIS = Student and Exchange Visitor Information System
- Government database includes all the information related to your current immigration status
- Your I-20 is an immigration document that shows some of the information in your SEVIS record
- It includes your SEVIS # (upper left corner)



How to maintain your F-1 status

- Keep your passport valid (it must be valid for <u>at least 6</u> months in the future)
- Make sure your I-20 is always up-to-date (if any changes occur)
- Make sure your I-94 is valid at all times (it should say F-1)
- Be enrolled full-time if you are a full-time commuting student or a non-commuting student
- Work only with <u>proper</u> authorization



Contact the OISS if...

- You would like to transfer your SEVIS record to another school in the U.S.
- You are changing majors
- You are changing levels (e.g. from Bachelor's to Master's or Master's to Doctorate)
- You are returning home before completion of your degree
- You would like to apply for a dependent's I-20 (F-2)
- You need to apply for a program extension
- If you have any questions about CPT or OPT applications
- If you would like to take classes at another school



Full-Time Enrollment

- Full-Time Commuting Canadian and Non-Commuting Undergraduate Students:
 - Must be enrolled in a at least 12 credits <u>during Fall and</u> <u>Winter</u> semesters.
- Full-Time Commuting Canadian and Non-Commuting Graduate Students:
 - Must be enrolled in at least 8 credits during <u>Fall and</u> <u>Winter</u> semesters.



Full-Time Status for Full-Time Commuting or Non-Commuting Students

- Full-time enrollment is <u>only required during the Fall and Winter</u> <u>semesters</u>.
- Full-time enrollment is required in Spring/Summer <u>only if it is</u> your first or last semester
- Full-time enrollment for Spring/Summer is 12 credits for undergraduate students and 2 credits for graduate students



Part-Time Status

- Part-time enrollment is defined as enrollment in any number of credits below the minimum required to qualify as full-time enrollment
- You must let the OISS know before the beginning of the semester whether you will be enrolling on a part-time or a full-time basis
- Part-Time Commuting students are issued a new I-20 on a semesterby-semester basis. Make sure to contact the OISS at least a month before your I-20 is set to expire so it can be extended.
- If you do not contact the OISS before your I-20 expires, your SEVIS
 record will be automatically closed and you will need to pay the
 SEVIS fee (\$350) again for a new record to be opened.



Concurrent Enrollment

- You can take classes at another SEVIS-approved F1 School while you are enrolled at WSU if:
 - You are taking at least half of your credits at WSU that semester (6 credits for undergraduates, 4 credits for graduates for students enrolled full-time)
 - You have received the initial approval from you Academic Advisor
 - You have submitted an application to the OISS and received the final approval from an OISS Advisor



Online Courses

- For Fall 2021, per the SEVIS COVID guidance, students on a new SEVIS record must be enrolled in <u>at least one course that</u> <u>is coded as in-person or hybrid.</u> The other courses you are taking can be online.
- Students who have transferred their SEVIS record from another institution can be enrolled in all online courses.

for Full-time Commuting or Non-Commuting Students

- Difficulty with reading, English language and American teaching methods
- Improper course placement
- Graduate teaching/research assistant
- Medical Condition
- Last Semester Exception

If you drop a course after the drop/add period, you will be <u>out of status</u> unless you qualify for an exception to full-time enrollment.



Employment

- On-Campus Employment:
 - Only students <u>enrolled full-time</u> (<u>Commuting and Non-Commuting</u>) are eligible to work on campus
 - Up to 20 hours/week during Fall and Winter semesters
 - Up to 40 hours/week during <u>all academic breaks</u>, including Spring/Summer semester
 - WSU employees, including Commuting Canadian students (e.g. GRAs/GTAs/Student assistants) may not perform their work while abroad. All work must be performed in the U.S.

 - For questions about CPT (internships) or OPT please contact the OISS



Social Security Number Application

- Required documents:
 - On-campus job offer letter (<u>you cannot apply for an SSN if you haven't received a job offer</u>)
 - Current I-20
 - Passport
 - I-94
 - OISS letter (you must request it on the OISS website: https://oiss.wayne.edu/current-students/doc-request)
- Once you have received the signed letter from the OISS, you can contact the closest Social Security Administration to make an appointment.



Driver's License Application

- You should make an appointment at the closest Secretary of State (SOS)
 office and bring the following documents:
 - Your SSN card (if you do not have one you should obtain a letter of ineligibility from the Social security Administration Office)
 - Your passport
 - Your I-20
 - Your I-94
 - Proof of Michigan residency (2 documents if you cannot provide those documents you can request a letter from the OISS which will can be used as proof here: https://oiss.wayne.edu/current-students/doc-request)

Mandatory Health Insurance

- Only students who live in the U.S. (Non-Commuting Canadian students) are required to purchase health insurance.
- Commuting Canadian students (full-time and part-time) can apply for a OHIP waiver here: https://online.oiss.wayne.edu/ohipwaiver/
- What insurance can you purchase?
 - All international students and their dependents, residing in the United States, must enroll in the WSU sponsored Student Accident and Sickness Plan administered by Blue Cross, Blue Shield of Michigan.
 - Coverage may be purchased either annually or each semester (2021-2022 Annual rate: \$1,220, Fall 2021 only: \$534)

Mandatory Health Insurance

- F1 students with health insurance provided through a Wayne State University
 Fellowship (including Rumble) or Graduate Assistantship (GRA/GSA/GTA) will
 automatically be enrolled in the repatriation plan each academic year. This
 coverage is mandatory for their F-2 dependent (cost for 2021-2022 is \$6)
- What does the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan plan cover?
 - A local and nationwide network of doctors, hospitals and specialists
 - Routine health services covered at 100% when you visit the University's Campus Health Center
 - Coverage for a number of services including doctor's office visits, emergency care, dental
 - services and prescription drugs
 - Travel Assistance and Worldwide Unlimited Medical Evacuation and Repatriation

School of Medicine Health Insurance Requirements

- All medical students (including Commuting Canadian students) can choose to purchase the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan health insurance or the Medical School Health Insurance package
- Medical students who are commuting from Canada may not use OHIP as healthcare coverage

Traveling Outside the US

- Make sure your I-20 has been signed by an OISS Advisor (on page 2). The
 Travel Signature is valid for <u>1 year.</u> Non-Commuting students must also
 submit an OISS Departure Form and your flight information if traveling by
 air.
- Check that your passport will be valid (not expired and valid for at least 6 months into the future when re-entering the U.S.)
- Check that your U.S. visa will be valid (not expired) on the day you are
 planning to reenter to the U.S.
- Carry a Verification of financial support (letter, bank statement or GRA/GTA contract demonstrating financial viability while in the U.S.)



Beware of scammers!

DHS/ICE/Social Security or the IRS <u>rarely</u> calls students. These agencies will **usually** send you all communications by a letter via the US Post Office.

You can tell if a call is a scam if the caller:

- Asks for money or gift cards to pay a fine or correct records
- Requests personal information (Social Security number, Passport number, or Alien Registration number)
- Identifies unlikely problems with your immigration record and/or mentions deportation
